Objectives

1. To become familiar with the Warwick University campus and services.
2. To start to work together within your tutor groups.
3. To appreciate some of the qualities for information, or lack of them!
4. To have fun!

Rules

1. You are free to collaborate between groups, especially with respect to Question 21.
2. There is a theme of less-than-perfect information throughout this activity. In particular the information quality in the questions is deliberately reduced in a few places (and perhaps accidentally in others!). For some questions you may have to find supporting information or help.
You can gain bonus points for identifying specific instances and descriptions of poor quality information (up to 3 points for each example of a different quality attribute of information), and for insights about how this affected your game strategies.
3. Answer the questions on this paper in readable English, and hand in to the organizer by the time specified (or risk losing penalty points), ensuring that your group ID is clearly shown. Apart from the time limit, it is not a direct race. You only need answer the questions for your group (see attached list), and will only get points for answering those questions!
4. It will be worthwhile doing some planning up front e.g. delegating and co-ordinating, since there is too much to stay together. It is suggested that you go in different directions in pairs, then meet up to pool results. You must allow time for this, and time is very limited!
5. The locations of the clues are not necessarily together, and not always explicitly specified; working out locations and 'optimal' transport time is considered part of the game! You will find answers to some questions directly; for others you must spot the location as you tour the campus. Plan some key buildings that you think you need to visit.
6. Student residence areas, Westwood and Gibbet Hill campus are excluded in the interests of time.
7. A prize will be awarded to the group that gains the most points, or in the event of a tie answers tie-break questions and/or writes the most insightful reflections.


